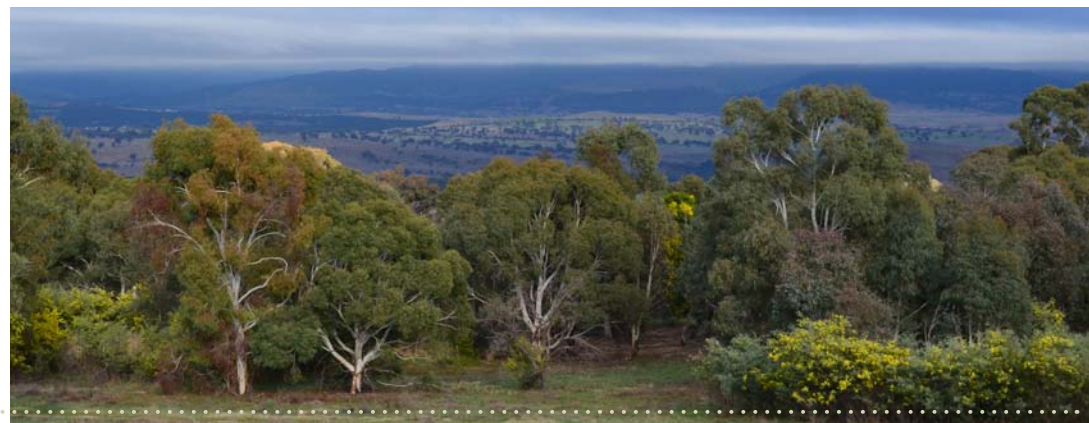

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What we have achieved

Our group is comprised of some 54 members. We have an ambitious agenda to improve the reserve. This includes continuing to implement our draft *Community Weed Management Plan*, a document which guides our efforts to control weeds in the reserve and highly invasive weeds nearby.

We have at our core a dedicated team of weekday weeders, as well as weekend groups, that collectively put in 943 hours effort during 2010-11 slashing, spraying and hoeing weeds across the reserve (we are likely to greatly exceed this effort in 2011-12). We closely monitor our weeding efforts so that we can track the effectiveness of our controls and learn as we go.

We work closely with the ACT Government on a joint program to control rabbits. We conducted

rabbit warren mapping and activity assessments in March and November 2011 to inform the effectiveness of the ACT's control program. Supervised by ACT Government experts, we conducted the first kangaroo survey of the reserve and adjacent lands in early May. As time permits, we are undertaking erosion surveys of creeks, tracks and soils across the reserve and adjacent public lands with a view to undertaking works. We are also concerned about the impacts of fire and fuel load management at the reserve.

And there is still more to do. We will be conducting planting days, and developing a *Rehabilitation Plan* to guide natural regeneration and planting activities. Our website provides detailed up to date information on our projects and activities.

What are our plans?

Our major commitment in 2012 is implementing the *Native Grass Restoration Project*. Funded by the ACT and Federal Governments and the Canberra Labor Club, to a total of more than \$52,000, this project examines ways of battling exotic grasses and restoring native groundcover to grassy woodland ecosystems, such as at The Pinnacle Nature Reserve. Restoring the native groundlayer is a major challenge to enhancing woodlands in our reserve and elsewhere in south-eastern Australia. We will be very busy with this project in Spring and Autumn through to the end of 2013.

Last year the ACT Government announced a *Woodlands Restoration Plan*, and that funding would be delivered to priority woodland corridors in and around Canberra.

Fotpin has worked with the ACT Government to develop a restoration plan for the Belconnen Hills, which includes The Pinnacle. Implementing this plan will be a priority in 2012, with extensive tree and shrub plantings planned in the Bottom Pinnacle and North Kama. In early June we will conduct the second of our annual kangaroo surveys.

We have also approached the ACT Government suggesting nearby parcels of land known as the "Bottom Pinnacle" and "North Kama" be included in the nature reserve. We have also proposed that a focal point or park care facility for outdoor environmental education, fotpin activities and environmental restoration studies be established on the North Kama property.
