
FrogWatch Census Training

October is FrogCensus month and FrogWatch needs trained volunteers to help with the survey efforts. Come along and learn how, where and when to monitor frogs and be part of this long-term citizen science program. Children (<16yrs) free, adults (17+) \$5; 5.30pm - 8.30pm

230 FrogWatch sites need to be monitored during the FrogTober frenzy. Many trained volunteers have already signed up to help out again- but there are still lots and lots of empty spots on the <u>online booking sheet</u>.

Booking your site(s) helps us to ensure that ALL FrogWatch sites are monitored, so please put your name next to your favourite spot(s)! Here are a few important hints:

1. The booking sheet has several tabs to help you finding your perfect site(s)

TAB 1 FW sites in alphabetical order—please enter your and your buddy(s) name into this list by clicking on OPEN IN GOOGLE SHEETS (ON TOP OF SHEET - only works if you are signed in to your google account). Alternatively, email your name and your chosen site code(s) to frogwatch@ginninderralandcare.org.au

The **Sites Nearby column** lists FW sites that you can easily monitor together, in case you want to visit several sites in a night.

TAB 2 FW sites sorted by suburbs/park – to locate sites near your suburb/ area of interest

TAB 3 FW sites sorted by area – to locate sites in your region (e.g., West Belconnen, Woden)

TAB 4, 5, 6 are for COOMA, REMOTE and PRIVATE sites

- **2. Site codes are hyperlinked** to the site page on the Canberra Nature Map find site and survey and information by using the tabs [field guide | sightings | surveys]
- 3. Private sites can only be accessed by permission
- **4.** Remote sites are generally done by the FrogWatch team as they require late night driving or even overnight camping. If you are interested in assisting with remote surveys, send us an email and we will try to make it possible.

In case you have signed up to monitor a site and can no longer do the required minimum of two surveys during October, you need to inform the FrogWatch team immediately, so that alternative arrangements can be put into place.

Tuning into frogs? There has never been a better time to get started! Since the last FW newsletter, the number of calling frog species has doubled.

To get feedback on your frog ID practise when being out and about, submit short audio recordings (frogs, birds etc) to the Canberra



Nature Map, using the NatureMapr app. Please note: this app can only be used for incidental frog call observations, not for FrogCensus surveys!!

Who is currently croaking:



Common Eastern Froglets or <u>Crinia signifera</u>
Whistling Tree Frog or <u>Litoria verreauxii</u>
Plains Toadlet or <u>Crinia parinsignifera</u>
Spotted Grass Frog or <u>Limnodynastes tasmaniensis</u>

Click on the links to hear their calls, which are much-much more exciting when listened to in the wild on a starry night!! So, what are you waiting for? Off you go...

Education

FrogWatch has been busy linking up with learners, teachers and the wider school community to discuss all kinds of frog related topics, including how and where to build frog friendly habitat.

These interactive and student-led talks are a great segway into the annual Tadpole Kits for Schools Program, funded by Icon Water. As in previous years, 120 classrooms across the capital region will be adorned with a tank full of tadpoles during term 4. Bookings are in full swing and can be done via the online Tadpole Booking Form

ACT frogs pocket guide

FrogWatch has received funding to create a new pocket guide for ACT frogs (ACT Environmental Grant). The guide will be a great tool for all FrogWatchers, as well as for anyone else interested in our local environment. Over the next few months, we will be working on the design to make it a user-friendly and fun educational tool. Stay tuned!

Interesting readings:

How many dwellings can you fit on an urban block? Plenty- according to ecologists from the East Gippsland region. We are talking about a different real-estate here: frog hotels, and they might be exactly what is needed to give hard hit frog species a helping hand. But Canberrans be awarethese hotels work only for the climbers among the frogs, which are not very common in the ACT. So, before you run off to your local hardware store, maybe think twice. Tips on how to attract frogs to your garden can be found in our frog-friendly habitat brochure.



Important request from the Conservation Council!!!!!!!!!



Defence Housing Australia, a Commonwealth Government agency, has put forward a proposal to develop the Lawson Grasslands for housing which will lead to the loss of approximately 15.8 hectares of critically endangered ecological communities under Commonwealth environment laws, and likely the degradation of much more. The proposal has just been referred for assessment by DHA under federal environmental laws despite the clear environmental damage that will occur and in defiance of strong community opposition.

The community now has just under 8 days to write to the federal environment minister explaining why this proposed action is clearly unacceptable.

Given the Federal Government's shared concerns about the recently released 2021 State of the Environment Report, which showed most of Australia's environmental indicators are in decline, it is disappointing that DHA, as a Federal agency, are even proceeding with this project that reaches into areas previously considered most suitable for conservation.

The State of the Environment report 2021 has shown us that the time to fight for nature has arrived and making a submission against the proposed development at Lawson Grasslands is the first action.

There are 78 species of glass frog species that live in Colombia—more than half of the total number of glass frogs in the world. New ones that live in the tropical Andes region are still being discovered, with researchers finding new information about their incredible biology.

Physicists and optics experts have theories about what makes their belly skin as transparent as glass and how their bones almost disappear while other research focuses on the behaviours of bachelor males to attract females.

This seminar will be presented with photos that serve as a window into the threatened world of these amazing amphibians, a living treasure trove of biodiversity in Colombia.
